ATEP now has spring & fall start options along with morning & evening offerings.


New Direction

Below is a summary of the new direction for the automotive technology department at Weber State University:

- The Automotive Technology Education Program (ATEP) has expanded. The program now offers spring and fall start options, morning and evening offerings, and is currently filled to capacity for the 2014-15 academic year.
- 2. The General Motors (GM) Automotive Service Education Program (ASEP) will remain the same. It has been determined that there is a growing demand for these technicians in this market area.

- The Toyota T-TEN program will no longer be offered. This was a mutual decision between WSU Automotive Technology and Toyota based on the lack of demand in this market area.
- 4. The Mopar CAP program has transitioned into a self-study, web -based program which will work in conjunction with ATEP. This decision was made based on the demand for Chrysler trained technicians in this market area.
- 5. The Collision Repair program has been placed on hold and is not currently accepting any new students. WSU Automotive Technology is meeting with members of the Collision Repair Advisory Committee along with other industry members to determine the best options for our graduates.
- Traditional recruitment visits to high schools will no longer occur. Instead, on-site technical demonstrations provided by WSU Automotive Technology faculty are available upon request.
