I. Course Objectives

- A.** To provide students with an integrative overview of the field of child psychology, major developmental milestones, and possible psychological problems and disorders associated with problems in development.
- B.** To familiarize students with the biological, social, psychological, and emotional influences of development during childhood as viewed from a number of different theoretical perspectives.
- C.** To provide an integrative view of research in the area of child psychology.
- D.** To discuss diverse pathways of change and development.
- E.** To provide knowledge of the processes and sequence of child development while identifying possible shortcomings and related problems with child development.

II. Course Requirements

- A. Exams:** each exam will consist of multiple choice, short answer, and essay questions; exams will be worth a total of 70% of your grade; the exams will not be comprehensive, however they will consist of material from the text as well as classroom handouts, lectures, and assignments; makeup exams will not be given. If you know you will be missing an exam please talk to me before the date of the exam.
- B. Essays:** essay questions will be given in class throughout the semester. The essays will consist of questions from class lectures and reading materials. They will be due one week from the date given. Each essay should be three to five pages in length, double-spaced. Essays will be worth 20% of the total grade.
- C. Class Attendance:** Attendance is mandatory as exams, activities, and discussions will only be completed during class times, thus, missing a class may lower your overall grade as certain activities and discussions cannot be made up. Attendance will be worth 10% of your grade.

III. Use of Electronic Media

Students may not use laptops during class, with the exception of using a laptop to take notes or to access Canvas for class materials. However, the professor reserves the right to ask the students to turn off any media during lectures, if the media interferes with the class discussions, lectures, or other presentations.
