Exams:

The exams will consist of approximately 45 multiple-choice items and 1 essay question. The exams are NOT comprehensive, and they will be designed to last approximately 1 hour.

You will be able to access the exams at the Testing Center located in the basement of the Social and Behavioral Sciences building. Each exam will be available to you for approximately 4 days. Your course outline will tell you when each exam is available. It is my expectation that you work alone and NOT use your textbook or any notes as you take the exams. Cheating on exams will result in immediate failure of the course and a report of your behavior to the department chair and the Dean of Students.

Poster Presentation:

Twenty-five percent of your grade will be based on a poster presentation that you will give at the end of the semester. There will be multiple deadlines leading to the presentation, and you can find these due dates in your course outline.

You will choose a disorder on which to present. One of your sources can be your textbook or other non-peer-reviewed source (website, *Psychology Today*, etc.). The remaining 2 sources **MUST** come from peer-reviewed, scientific journals. Throughout the semester, you will submit brief summaries of each of your sources. Please note that while the summaries **MUST** be in your own words, I grade HEAVILY on spelling, grammar, and sentence structure. Please be sure to proofread your summaries thoroughly before submitting them. **If you submit a summary with sufficiently substandard writing**

proficiency, I will require that you use the Writing Center before you submit any future written work.

You will use these summaries to construct a poster that you will present at the end of the semester. Please note that you will not be presenting your poster to the entire class. Rather, ½ of the class will present each day, and the other ½ sill circulate about the room and ask questions about the posters.

LATENESS POLICY:

Your instructor believes that it is vitally important to adhere to all deadlines noted in the course outline. Making a regular practice of respecting deadlines will go a long way toward success in the various areas of your life. However, your instructor recognizes that emergencies do occur and that they can interfere with even the most serious intent to respect deadlines. Therefore, your instructor expects that we will adhere to the following:

- If you are sick, please stay home until you are no longer contagious. Generally, the standard is going 24 hours without a fever. Your instructor and classmates do not want to be infected with whatever illness you might have.

- 4. Generally speaking, the penalty for late submission of an exam or assignment will be 20% if it is submitted within 2 business days of the deadline. After 2 days, the score becomes a zero.

While every effort will be made to adhere to the course outline, all times, topics, and subjects covered will be at the instructor's discretion and could change. Advance notice will be given if a change is necessary.

book often to ensure that your assignment and exam grades are entered properly. I may also email the class with announcements.

It is the instructor's expectation that the work you submit is in fact your work.
