ANNIE TAYLOR DEE Improving Access to Healthcare: Creation of an NURSING **Online Prenatal Education Program**

BACKGROUND

Pregnancy and delivery can be an overwhelming journey for expectant parents. As a result, parents can feel anxious and unsure of what to expect during labor and delivery^{1,5}. Many expectant parents are unable to receive formal prenatal education for a variety of reasons and may rely on friends and peers to receive education vital to have a successful pregnancy and labor and delivery⁴. The purpose of this project is to provide an easily accessible and affordable online prenatal educational course for expectant parents.

The question asked for this project is: Does offering a free or reduced-cost online prenatal class to low-income pregnant women improve their knowledge regarding prenatal care and delivery?

METHODS

The lowa Model Revised^{2,3} will be used to guide this project. A literature review identified three themes:

• There is a lack of prenatal education

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- Prenatal education is important for expectant parents
- There are different prenatal education formats available

After the project has been approved for implementation, the following steps will be taken

- A timeline of the project will be created
- A staff meeting will be held to present information about the project, and presenting the deliverables in a PowerPoint Format
- A flyer will be distributed to provider's offices, and will be available for patients who come through L&D triage
- A patient screening form will be given to patients interested in participating in the prenatal classes
- A prenatal class PowerPoint will be created

Both nurses and patients will be able to build their knowledge and confidence when there are better educational options.

This project will allow nurses to provide more direct patient care when a patient is admitted for a routine delivery instead of having to spend time educating the patient. This program aids expectant parents by providing them with the education they need to be confident during pregnancy, postpartum, and caring for their newborn.
