Student's will be evaluated on whether they have read the assigned articles/articles and on their participation in class discussions.

II. YOUR FINAL GRADE WILL BE BASED ON:

Three take-home open-book examinations (90 % of grade), participation in class discussions, attendance at required DOVAD artist lectures and films and adherence to generally acceptable rules of behavior (10% of grade). No extra credit assignments will be given.

i. EXAMINATIONS:

The three essay exams (1. Pre-Mid Term; 2. Mid-Term; 3. Final), will be take-home open-book exams. For each you will be required to analyze a work of art in the format provided in the "Writing Guide". Images for analysis will be given to students a week prior to the examination due date.

The works of art will be selected from your text by the instructor. Students will select and analyze ONE work of art for each examination. The information you provide is to be based on information covered in class, from your text book, from videos, and/or from assigned readings on reserve. The 3 examinations will be put on Canvas.

ii. PARTICIPATION:

During the semester students will be required to:

iia. Read a number of articles for class discussion (the articles will be posted on e-reserve. (Go weber.edu- Stewart Library- Course reserve- Instructor's name- course number- print-out article/articles- read and take notes [dates for readings TBA]).

iib. Attend four DOVAD events: artist/guest lectures, and/or films sponsored by the Department of Visual Art & Design.

Students are responsible for keeping track of events that are taking place in DOVAD (a list of events will be posted on Canvas). Proof of attendance: you are required to have your "GO" cards validated at the event (cards will be given to students by the instructor).

III. GRADING CRITERIA FOR THIS COURSE: (What is the instructor looking for?)

Students will be required to demonstate:

- i. the ability to communicate information effectively by writing or presenting answers in grammatically correct English and in logical and sequential order.
- ii. the understanding of concepts/terms taught in class and mentioned in the text;
- iii. the ability to analyze works of art and think critically about their message;
- iv. the ability to interpret works of art and draw parallels with contemporary life (where relevant);

v. the ability to reason and draw conclusions from the subject/message of an art object;

vi. the ability to justify their point of view while mentioning other possible interpretations- where relevant.

IV. ATTENDANCE:

Because the class introduces cultures, topics, terms and concepts that are far removed from the experience of the average student, attendance is more important than normal. You are allowed three absences; the fourth class you miss will result in your grade being lowered by one letter grade; 6 absences will result in a failing grade.

Students who are habitually late to class (beyond 5 minutes) will be marked with one absence for every 2 late arrivals. Class runs for the allotted time (ie., from 1.30-3.15 pm). You will be given a five-minute break about half way through the class. If you have an important appointment because of which you have to leave before class is dismissed, please let the instructor know before class starts or during the break.

xiii. Academic Honesty/Plagiarism: Plagiarize: To steal or use (the ideas or writings of another) as one's own. To appropriate passages or ideas from another and use them as one's own. (The American Heritage Dictionary) Derivation: Greek plagious: oblique, crooked, treacherous; Latin plagium: kidnapping

Honesty requires that any ideas or materials taken from another source for either written or oral use must be fully acknowledged. Offering the work of another as one's own is plagiarism. Any student who fails to give credit for ideas or materials that s/he takes from another source is guilty of plagiarism. Penalties for plagiarism are often severe. Depending on the specific nature of the act, a student found guilty of plagiarism may receive an E in the course or even be dismissed from the university with a notation of the offense on his/her transcript. If you are in doubt about the legitimate use of sources for your papers or presentations, check with me. I will assist you in ensuring the originality of your ideas and avoiding subsequent confrontations and penalties (Adapted from Handbook of Teaching Assistants, Department of Speech Communication, Indiana University).
