


Graph 3 Active AmeriCorps Members by Grant Year



Graph 4 CCEL Community Partners Top Tier Numbers, 2014-2024



Graph 5 Excellence in Community Engagement



Community Partner Breakfast

On August 3, 2023, CCEL hosted its annual community partner appreciation event at the WSU Community Education Center. We celebrated our partnership with our community partners over a great lunch from Hug-Hes Cafe. We used an Alice in Wonderland MAD theme, MAD stood for Making a Difference and we provided our community partners with a t-shirt that went with the

theme. We had 25 different community partner organizations attend and we expressed our gratitude for them working with us during a transition in leadership.

Lindquist Lecture

On Tuesday, October 3, 2023 Professor Jame Zagrodnick gave the 2023 John A. Lindquist Lecture entitled “The CAN is in the Can’t” in the Hetzel-Hoellein Room in Stewart Library.

Two volunteer fairs were organized this year: one in the fall and one in the spring. All community partners are invited to the volunteer fairs, but the space is limited to allow 29 partners to attend.

Speed Networking

The Speed Networking event was held on November 9, 2023. CEL faculty and existing community partners were invited to meet each other. CEL faculty were encouraged to share information about the course learning outcomes and community partners were asked to share any projects that students had previously completed. The event is held to create connections among those in attendance to encourage them to work collaboratively to create opportunities for students enrolled in the courses to address.

Volunteer Management Training

The CCEL requires any community partner wishing to be a Wildcat or Purple Pride-tiered partner to attend a Volunteer Management Training series. This required training gives our volunteer managers the tools necessary to run an effective volunteer program, which allows CCEL to be more confident in recommending them to students looking for community-engaged experiences.

Community partners were made aware of opportunities offered by 501 Commons and UServe Utah throughout the year.

Pathways of Public Service and Civic Engagement Training

The CCEL started implementing Standford's Pathways of Public Service and Civic Engagement to expand how students, staff, faculty, and community partners see community engagement. To become familiar with the six pathways. UServe Utah was invited to provide a training on the Pathways of Community Engagement, which aligns with Pathways of Public Service and Civic Engagement. Community Partners and staff were invited to attend the training.

WSU Service Day of Remembrance

The 12th Annual Service Day of Remembrance was hosted on Wednesday, October 11, 2023 during Weber State University's annual Homecoming Week. Two projects were organized. One project was hosted in collaboration with DaVinci Academy and the Ogden Nature Center. This project focused on pulling invasive weeds and learning about how students can become active members in their communities to create sustainable ways of living. DaVinci organized to have their seniors from their high school participate and Weber State University organized volunteers to serve alongside the high school students. There were a total of 62 volunteers who contributed a total of 310 hours. The second project was in partnership with the American Red Cross and OWCAP. Participants helped assemble 100 care packages for veterans and cut out storybook kits. There were a total of 38 impacts logged on GivePulse for a total of 59 hours. Both projects were led by the Community Engagement Team.

Waldo Reads

Beginning in summer 2023, CCEL began to look into revitalizing the community work-study program over the course of AY 23-24 we successfully secured funding from Financial Aid, United Way of Northern Utah, and OgdenCAN to start WALDO Reads, an AmeriCorps Reads program that utilizes the University of Utah Reading Clinic's evidence based literacy tutoring intervention, and support WSU's engagement with the Utah Higher Education AmeriCorps Network. A new Community Work-Study position (.75 FTE, non-exempt) was created and filled in May 2024.

University Assisted Community Schools

The Vice Provost and colleagues from United Way of Northern Utah visited the Netter Center at the University of Pennsylvania in October 2023 to learn more about University Assisted Community Schools in an effort to better understand the approach and consider how WSU could be more involved in the community school work of UWNU and Ogden School District. UWNU contracted with Coalition for Community Schools to develop an integrated work plan for the three entities over the course of AY23-24. The asset map that is being developed by the Office of Community Research and Evaluation is intended to inform this effort so that WSU can be more strategic and intentional about engaging with schools, educators, and after school providers in OSD. Waldo Reads is an example of an early success in this collaboration.

Student Learning Outcomes

Community Engagement Team

The Community Engagement Team focused on community partner support and providing community engagement opportunities for the general student body to engage in throughout the academic year. Students were encouraged to organize opportunities that would enhance the

learning experience of their student peers outside of the classroom. Team meetings focused on team camaraderie and providing updates on their position progress. The students receive an evaluation to anonymously complete regarding their leadership experience to help the CCEL staff review the impact of their experiences, overall satisfaction with the team, and ways to improve. This was the first year the team was not managed within the Student Involvement and Leadership office where specific learning outcomes were highlighted as it related to that department. This year is an interim year for the team as it will be restructured next year to reflect the Pathways of Public Service and Civic Engagement. Intentional learning outcomes will be established that follow CCEL's general learning outcomes as well as learning outcomes that align with the Pathways.

Social Issues Team

Student outcomes for the Social Issues Team included four presentations on the different stages of their ongoing research project investigating barriers to financial aid at WSU. These included a paper presentation at a national conference, NCA 2023 in National Harbor, a research proposal presentation to the VP of Student Access and Success, a poster presentation of preliminary findings at the WSU Spring Research Symposium, and a final presentation to the VP of Student Access and Success. While these four presentations serve as summative assessments of the SIT's work over the year, the co-advisors provided regular formative feedback as the students designed the research study, completed a literature review, interviewed participants, analyzed the qualitative data, and created presentations.

Alternative Breaks

Alternative Breaks focused on animal welfare through a project with Best Friends Animal Sanctuary. Participating students were provided with the opportunity to learn about and reflect on various pathways of public service through direct service and community organizing and activism (learning about the No Kill shelter movement). Students engaged in daily reflections and logged impacts in Givepulse.

Weber Cares Program

Food & Resource Pantry

The Weber Cares Food & Resource Pantry provided in-person services in Room 224 of the Stewart Library. CCEL employed one hourly student (Uli Lopez, then Ja'Nyah Clark) who

oversaw the pantry. This student employee organized volunteers to maintain the pantry operations. A total of 95 volunteers served this year with 298 hours.

A total of 642 students, staff, or faculty were served by the Weber Cares Pantry in 2023-2024 fiscal year. Visitation peaked in October and November of the Fall 2022 semester with 238 visits in October 2023 and 282 visits in November. February and April 2023 also had high visitation. The amount of students, staff, faculty, and their families visiting the pantry increased compared to last year.

The pantry continues to provide Pantry Packs from Catholic Community Services. These pantry packs are located and distributed from the Women's Center, WSU Housing & Residence Life, Shepherd Union Information Desk, WSU Davis Campus, WSU Police Department, and the Money Management Center.

Weber State students, faculty and staff can order pantry packs to be delivered to the Davis Campus. These orders are fulfilled on the Ogden Campus, delivered by the Stewart Library to the Davis Student Services for pick up. A total of 99 Davis Campus orders were made via the online form with an increase by almost double from last year.

Food Voucher Program

The Weber Cares Food Voucher Program is an emergency option for immediate food needs which provides a \$10 same-day-use voucher for WSU students to use at any Weber Dining food vendor located in the Shepherd Union Building (restrictions apply). Vouchers are valid at the Davis Campus, but have not been utilized. Any current WSU student who requests a voucher, must complete an intake form to verify how often they have received a voucher in order to intervene with additional resources where necessary.

Participation: 149 food vouchers (80 vouchers in AY 22-23) were used by WSU students between June 2023 through April 2024, which equaled a total of \$1,297.18.

CEL Community of Practice

The Center for Community Engaged Learning aimed to collaborate with asset-rich communities to nurture sustained social change. The Community Engaged Learning COP introduced diverse approaches to Community Engaged Learning theory and practice to support participants' teaching practice and the development of one or more proposals for community-engaged learning courses.

Facilitated by CCEL Faculty-in-Residence and Dance Program Director Jo Blake and Executive Director Alexis Bucknam, we invited the participation of up to ten (10) WSU faculty and staff members to meet throughout the 2023-24 academic year. Members of the CoP explored community engagement pedagogies, student reflection design, reciprocal partnership building, community research models, community project design, and a variety of additional topics. Members and many of Weber State University's community partners will also network with one another.

This was a great opportunity for faculty looking to incorporate community engagement into their courses and those seeking to produce community-engaged research. Staff involved as adjuncts and their student leaders also benefited from this Community of Practice as they considered effective community engagement methods.

- Attend, prepare for, and actively participate in six (6) of the seven (7) Communities of Practice session
- Successfully apply during the spring semester to have one (1) or more courses designated with the CEL course attribute
- Present CoP project at one's college faculty meeting

- Option to seek CCEL financial support to attend a local or regional conference focused on Community Engagement in Higher Education

Community Research and Evaluation Projects

Community Asset Maps

Three research assistants were hired on to help develop two community asset maps. ThinkTank funding was used to support the learning experience for the research assistants and to compensate them fairly for their time. Students developed an understanding of community asset mapping and how to apply it, a foundation in qualitative research methods, research communications skills, and were able to apply an asset-based lens to community research. Administration in each Weber State University (WSU) college completed a form of current programs, events, and initiatives that happen in the K-12 space and support undergraduate retention efforts. This asset map supported WSU efforts to address the needs of the community, contribute to K-12 education in the community, and increase the enrollment and retention of degree-seeking students. United Way of Northern Utah (UWNU) sought to identify all college and career readiness programs and initiatives within Ogden School District. This asset map supported UWNU's efforts to address college and career readiness within Ogden School District. Another form was sent to administrators and program coordinators in Ogden School District.

Boys and Girls Club of Weber-Davis

A continuation from previous years, CRE's Evaluator and Community Research Analyst conducted a program evaluation for five sites under Utah State's 21st Century Grant. The main

reason for the evaluation is to improve program implementation and student learning outcomes for youth and teens enrolled at Boys and Girls Club. The evaluation continued through August 2023.

Ogden Civic Action Network Evaluation

Ogden Civic Action Network requested an evaluation of its coalition to help inform its program review. Fifteen interviews with board members were conducted and a survey was sent to 13 grantees, four staff, and 19 board members. A document review was conducted of 142 internal documents, including annual reports, communication, meeting results, awards, strategic planning, and grants. Evaluation was presented to the Program Review Committee on February 27, 2024.

Roy Cone – Partnerships for Student Success

Roy Cone at Weber School District received the Partnerships for Student Success grant from the Utah Board of Education. The grant requires a technical assistance provider to help with the evaluation of the grant. CRE is the technical assistance provider for the grant.

United Way of Northern Utah – Partnerships for Student Success

United Partnership Council (UPC) continues to expand its work into the Ogden and neighboring communities. As such, there is a need for data analysis support, research, and evaluation has increased. Last year, UPC signed a MOU with Ogden School District for individual-level student data. The CRE keeps the data, where it is processed and analyzed. The CRE continues to support UWNU with all data support needed.

Ogden Food Council

CRE staff served as backbone staff and evaluator for the Ogden Food Council (formed in January 2022) and served on all of their work groups. The Ogden Food Council dissolved into the Weber Food Innovation Group, part of the City of Marriott-Slaterville. Backbone support for the council ended in March 2024 for the CRE and in April for UWNU.

Progress Made on Goals

Goals for 2023-2024

Develop a Center for Community Engaged Learning strategic plan

CCEL has developed a strategic plan for 2024 - 2027. However, with the SB 261 changes were revising the strategic plan to ensure our mission, vision, values, and goals align with guidance on the law.

Fill staff vacancies in the Center for Community Engaged Learning

CCEL has successfully filled all vacancies prior to May 2024. The Executive Director, Dr. Alexis Buckna, started in July and worked with the Vice Provost to undertake a reorganization. The result of that reorganization was elevating the Assistant Director position to an Associate Director role and reclassifying the Administrative Specialist position from a II to a III. The existing Student Engagement Coordinator, Teresa Martinez, was promoted into the Associate Director role and the Student Engagement Coordinator position was vacated. Allison Lambert was hired for the Administrative Specialist III role and began in December 2023.

Another result of the reorganization was renaming the Community Research Extension to the Office of Community Research & Evaluation. The Director had relocated out of state so they separated in September and a search for their successor was undertaken. The new Director, Dr. Laura Hill started in early March 2024. The CRE supervisor, Yesenia Quintana, was offered a new position on campus as the Director of the Community Education Center so the search for their successor is under way.

Finally, the Student Engagement and, newly created, Community Work Study Coordinator positions were filled in April and May 2024 respectively.

Start an America Reads Tutoring program to work with Ogden, Weber, and Davis School Districts

In fall semester CCEL approached Financial Aid about securing some Federal Work Study (FWS) funding to create a staff position to start an America Reads program and support community partners with developing community work study placements to support the requirement that a minimum of 7% of FWS placements are community based. Financial Aid committed \$25,000 of the allowable \$75,000 from the Job Location and Development funds toward a coordinator position. Once those funds were secured and a plan was put in place to

work with the United Way of Northern Utah and Ogden School District, United Way committed \$10,000 per year for two years. CCEL continued to work with United Way and OSD to work out the details of a literacy tutoring program and named it WALDO (Wildcats Advancing Literacy Development in the Ogden region) Reads. The support from these two partners was critical to securing \$23,000 per year from Ogden Civic Action Network for FYs 25 and 26. This last bit of funding allowed CCEL to list the Community Work Study Coordinator position which will lead WALDO Reads, support partners in accessing community work study, and coordinate the Utah Higher Education AmeriCorps Network for WSU.

Adopt and socialize the pathways of public service and civic engagement

CCEL began to integrate the pathways of public service and civic engagement (pathways) in Spring 2024. The Community Partnerships Coordinator, Sandra Baltazar, worked with the Utah Commission on Service and Volunteerism (USERVE) to host a pathways training with over a dozen community partners and the CCEL staff. The Associate Director, Teresa Martinez, revised the student leadership approach away from the community engagement team toward the pathways and selected 6 student leaders to serve as fellows for each of the pathways: direct service, philanthropy, community engaged learning and research, community organizing and activism, policy and governance, and social entrepreneurship and corporate social responsibility. Finally, the Pathways were added to the CEL Attribute application so faculty can signal which pathway(s) their community engaged learning assignments align with.

- Increase community engagement knowledge, competence, and confidence of CCEL team
 - Develop a PREP goal for the entire team related to developing subject matter expertise in CE
- Continue to integrate the Pathways of Public Service and Civic Engagement
 - Communications, website, social media, and swag updates
 - Support faculty in understanding and applying the pathways

- Support community partners in identifying and signaling the pathway(s) that their organization is seeking community engaged WSU community members to join them in their social change efforts.
- Increase Givepulse utilization
 - Increase the number of CEL faculty and instructors using Givepulse to track CE in their courses
 - Increase staff traffic to the Givepulse service leave page
- Advance university assisted community school work with UWNU and OSD
 - Identify concrete ways that WSU can be contributing to strategic deployment of our assets to support OSD
