

Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice—General Concentration

All Criminal Justice students are encouraged to meet with the faculty advisor at least annually for course and program advisement. Grade Requirements: A grade of "C" or better in all courses is required for this major in addition to an overall GPA of 2.5 or higher.

Program Requirements for BS Degree

Students obtaining a major in Criminal Justice are required to complete 46 credit hours in courses with a CJ prefix. Students are also required to complete a minor.

CJ Electives (15 credit hours)

In addition to the 31 hours of core courses, students are required to complete an additional 15 hours of Criminal Justice courses. These are courses offered at WSU with CJ prefixes or other courses as approved by the department chair. Consider taking at least 3 upper division CJ elective courses (numbered 3000 or higher) to complete the University's 40 hour upper division requirement.
