3. Administrative Update – Brad Mortensen

Discussion on the enrollment is looking really strong for the spring semester. The numbers look good. Expressed appreciation of the hard work of faculty with retaining students. Budget update, the governor released the budget recommendations last week. The recommendation is 2.3% COLA for higher education and 1.8% for targeted compensation increases. That is a starting point. There is about 23.5 million set aside for performance funding which is less than WSU got last year. There is a third of that will not get allocated out of the performance funding because none of the schools hit the metrics. WSU will get a 100 % of the high yield, high demand degree completion but will only get about half this year. Does not look like there are not going to be cuts but we won't see a lot of state taxes. Free speech resolution was adopted by the board of education Dec 1 and this is strong support for faculty and students. Because there are different areas affected there is a presidential task force to address the policies and align them with the standards. 76 days from now the legislature will be open. It will be a contentious session for higher education, including the EDI coming back up again. Asked faculty to think carefully about how they put themselves out there. Question was about EDI coming back and Brad said something is coming back but do not know what. There is a different leadership in the legislature and we are unsure how they will react. There may be talk about tenure in the legislature not for sure but people are talking about it.

7. Presentation of Faculty Salary survey- Valerie Herzog, Loisanne Kattelman, Huiying Hill, Tracy

Covey, Tressa Quayle

Presentation of the Faculty Salary survey that was created based on the current year's faculty salaries. This is calculated to a nine month contract and not all faculty are on a nine month contract. The presentation looks at different aspects and looks at the data to use a basis for salaries and differences. The data collected was used to look at inversions in different colleges. (Inversions are not looking at years in rank) Inversions were going down over the last few years but this year there was a big jump in the amount of inversions. The presentation has been recorded and will be added to the faculty survey for people.

8. Policy on Service Leave - Stephanie Hollist

This policy addresses staff's ability to use service leave more broadly and without staff having to take time off. It opens up for other opportunities to use the eight hours of service leave, with the approval of their supervisor.

9. Replacing Lighted W on the hill- Jessica Oyler, Jake Cain

For years Weber State University has lit the W with rebar and Christmas lights. The university has tried to have different versions of the W on the mountain. The university would like to create a W made with solar panels that will feed back into the grid to give back to the community. It will send about the same amount of energy that is needed for Outdoor Education and Recreation building. The funding will come from the energy funds and donor funds. The flaming W will be made in a way to reduce light pollution.

The university is working with architects on the design and implementation of the W. There was discussion on damage and reseeding to the area where the panels will be. The approach is that there will be minimal impact on the location. But will address any damage. The students really like the idea and also expressed concerns about vandalism.

10. FMLA survey findings- Andrea Garavito Martinez & Maria del Mar González-González

Discussion on the FMLA findings that was completed in February or March. Some people were getting course release and others were not. 102 faculty responded and there were varying answers on who took leave and who did not. 36 mentioned taking a leave and 66 mentioned not taking a leave. There was also a difference in what was assigned and who assigned the extra duties for the faculty. There were a range of reasons as to why the faculty felt about the experiences. It is typically assistant and associate professors that took the leave. The Equity Diversity and Inclusion committee would like to see more support from Human Resources. The committee also would like to see more information that can be shared with faculty to help in the understanding of FMLA.

11. Adjunct Report- Deana Froerer

Wanted to share the presentation with the faculty senate that was given at the adjunct faculty retreat. One of the concerns of adjuncts is that there is no place for adjuncts in the organizational chart. Would like to see an adjunct advisory council based on something similar to the Staff advisory council. Discussion on training, compensation, and extra duties. Working towards a recognition may be adjunct 1 and adjunct 2. Also a concern for adjuncts is the pay schedule. It is quite a ways into the semester making it difficult for adjuncts to pay their bills. Thanked everyone for the opportunity to share the adjunct information and concerns with the Faculty Senate.
