

# 12 EXCELLENT PROFESSORS

Twelve of the year's top professors at Weber State University received the 2025 Presidential Teaching Excellence Award after being nominated by students, staff, and fellow faculty members. WSU President **Brad Mortensen** called this year's recipients "truly outstanding teachers that make a difference at the university." The president personally delivered the news to each professor via surprise visits to their classrooms and other spaces on campus, and read aloud some of the most touching excerpts from nomination letters written by students. This year's winners join an elite group of more than 70 recipients since the awards launched in 2018 thanks to a generous endowment gift from Bob and Marcia Harris.

# BRADY PRESIDENTIAL DISTINGUISHED PROFESSORS



Two Weber State professors representing sociology and physical education are this year's Brady Presidential Distinguished Professors. Named after the late Rodney Brady who served as WSU president from 1978 to 1985, the honor recognizes WSU professors who demonstrate the highest quality teaching, scholarship, research, and community service.

# **MARJUKKA OLLILAINEN**

Since joining Weber State in 1999, sociology professor Marjukka Ollilainen has earned praise for intellectually rigorous and engaging teaching. Throughout the years, students have described her as transformative to their academic and professional paths.

Known for her innovative and interdisciplinary approach, she teaches courses that explore complex social themes such as consumerism, emotions, and work-life dynamics.

Beyond teaching, Ollilainen is an accomplished researcher, publishing extensively on gender and work in both American and European contexts. Her scholarship has appeared in both English and Finnish publications and

is widely recognized for its analytical depth and cross-cultural insights. She has contributed to numerous sociology journals, served on editorial boards, and held leadership roles in professional organizations such as the Pacific Sociological Association and Sociologists for Women in Society.

Her crucial roles in university governance include serving as chair of the sociology department for nine years, vice chair of the Faculty Senate, and College of Social & Behavioral Sciences representative on the University Planning Council. Her advocacy efforts have led to meaningful policy changes, such as the development of a family leave policy for faculty and grant creation for adjunct faculty.

With her outstanding contributions to teaching, research, and leadership, Ollilainen has elevated WSU and continues to shape the field of sociology.



# **JAMES ZAGRODNIK**

James Zagrodnik's contributions to the Department of Health, Physical Education & Recreation have left a lasting impression on WSU students, faculty, and the community.

A passionate educator, Zagrodnik is known for his engaging teaching style, high standards, and commitment to student success. His mentorship has shaped the lives of countless students, providing them with the knowledge, skills, and confidence to excel in college and their careers.

As creator and director of the skill development program Children's Adaptive Physical Education Society, better known as CAPES!, Zagrodnik has opened opportunities for WSU students to earn more than 22,000 service-learning hours, preparing future educators while enhancing the lives of children with developmental disabilities.

Zagrodnik has also proven his dedication to global education through the New Zealand Adventures study abroad program, which immerses students in Māori culture and perspectives on health, physical activity, and environmental stewardship.

His groundbreaking research on the physiological effects of pickleball has opened new avenues in the field and provided undergraduate students with valuable hands-on experience.

Zagrodnik successfully guided his department through two restructures as chair. His advocacy for faculty and students has strengthened programs and streamlined university operations. During his time at Weber State, he has also earned the 2024 Career Champion Award and the 2018 Crystal Crest Master Teacher Award.



# UNWAVERING DEDICATION: DIXON AWARDS

Among Weber State's outstanding faculty and staff, three long-serving members earned this year's H. Aldous Dixon Award. Since 1970, the WSU Alumni Association has honored outstanding members of WSU's faculty and staff with the annual award named in memory of President Dixon, who served as the school's chief administrator from 1919 to 1920, and from 1937 to 1953.

# **KEN JOHNSON**

Associate Dean and Professor, Dr. Ezekiel R. Dumke College of Health Professions

Johnson first came to WSU as a staff member in Continuing Education after working for 15 years in healthcare, holding positions in hospital and clinic administration and marketing. He joined the faculty of the Dumke College in 1998, primarily teaching in healthcare administration and population health. He now serves as associate dean of the college.

While serving as chair for the Department of Health Administrative Services, Johnson developed and became the founding director for the Master of Health Administration program, which is nearing its 20th year and has been a model for other master's programs within the college.

In all of his roles at WSU, Johnson has been known for innovative teaching and putting students first. He has created and taught more than a dozen different courses. He gets to know his students well and still connects with some from his earliest time as a professor.

In the past few years, he has co-written two textbooks to help students better understand healthcare management. He has written a number of articles and presented at regional, national, and international conferences on topics dealing with organizational behavior, emotional intelligence, employee wellness, and retention.

Johnson holds a Ph.D. in health education from the University of Utah. He is a fellow of both the American



College of Healthcare Executives and the Association of Schools of Allied Health Professions, and he has post-doctorate training in leadership, management, and emotional intelligence. He has served on many health associations and boards from local to national levels, including the Healthy People Curriculum Task Force in Washington, D.C., as past president of the National Association of Local Boards of Health, and chair of the Association of University Programs in Health Administration Board of Directors.

In his free time, he enjoys golf, woodworking, and being a grandfather.

# **JESSICA OYLER**

Vice President, Division of Student Access & Success

Oyler has more than 16 years of experience at WSU, where she has held several key positions and currently holds the position of vice president for Student Access & Success. Other positions include serving as the associate provost for Enrollment Management and Student Success, assistant vice president for Human Resources, and executive director of Student Affairs Strategic Initiatives. She is also an adjunct faculty member for the First Year Experience and Master of Education programs.

Throughout her career, Oyler has spearheaded numerous student success initiatives at Weber State through collaborations with staff and faculty across campus. She is a staunch supporter of the institution's commitment to access for all, no matter their background; high-quality educational experiences; and faculty and staff engagement in the broader community. She has co-authored and coedited two books on assessment in student affairs and presented at numerous national conferences.

# BRINGING BACK LESSONS FROM SPAIN


Two Weber State professors earned the prestigious Don Quixote de La Mancha Scholarship awarded by the Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities to faculty members who have proven their commitment to advancing Spanish language and culture.

Last month, Spanish instructor Morgan Call and Joseph Mulligan, assistant professor of Spanish translation and interpretation, traveled to Toledo, Spain, to participate in a week-long program in collaboration with the University of Castilla-La Mancha. While there, they received training in the language and culture to enhance expertise and integrate their knowledge into WSU curriculum.



"This is a special opportunity that doesn't happen all the time," Mulligan said. "The more familiar professors are with various cultures and linguistic practices, the better we're able to support our students no matter where their interests take them."

# WSU NAMES NEW DEAN OF EAST BRIAN RAGUE



The new dean of the College of Engineering, Applied Science & Technology brings more than 21 years of experience guiding and promoting Weber State University.

Brian Rague has served as associate dean of EAST since 2018 and, before that, was chair of the Department of Computer Science. He will begin serving as dean on July 1, taking over from **David Ferro**, who led the college for more than 13 years.

"I've been fortunate enough to have interacted with quite a few folks across the university," Rague said. "And everyone is invested in student success, across the board, so I'm excited to leverage that existing camaraderie."

As dean, Rague will oversee seven academic programs, 100 faculty members, 30 staff members, and about 3,200 student majors.

"The vision of the college going forward should be just as big and just as encompassing as the size of the college," Rague said.

Some of his goals include continuing to attract new majors, maintaining retention, and ensuring programs appeal to students of all backgrounds. He's also exploring other possibilities, like more apprenticeships, so students can earn an income while they're learning.

"I'd like to emphasize all the different ways we can train our workforce, train our students and provide individuals with fulfilling careers," he said.

During his time at WSU, Rague secured more than \$10.3 million in grant funding to improve learning opportunities and career pathways. He played a key role in establishing WSU's School of Computing and led the charge to create a variety of other successful centers and programs, including EAST's first graduate degree program.

Rague's research interests include data science, algorithm design, formal analysis, parallel computing, programming languages, and opportunities for creative software engineering in the fields of education, biomedicine, and physics. He also brings industry experience and connections from working on various NASA projects, including satellite missions at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, California.

He earned his bachelor's degree in electrical engineering and computer science from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, a master's degree in aeronautics and astronautics from MIT, and a Ph.D. in computer science from the University of Utah.



# INCOMING: NEW DEAN FOR GODDARD JEREMY OLLER



This summer, the John B. Goddard School of Business & Economics at Weber State will welcome a new dean. Jeremy Oller comes to WSU from the University of Central Oklahoma, where he served as dean of the College of Business, leading initiatives to strengthen academic quality, student engagement, and industry partnerships.

"I want to give students the best possible experience when they come to college," Oller said. "It's all about them, their learning, and making sure they're ready to enter the workforce."

Oller said he was drawn to Weber State because low tuition offers students the best return on investment. "Weber is student-focused. As dean, that's something you want to see: Is the university following through on its core mission? I found that to be an overwhelming 'yes."

He was also impressed by the "incredible" quality of WSU faculty and staff. As the new dean, Oller said he wants to invest in their talent.

"The Goddard School is already doing a great job, so what I'm hoping to bring is excitement and the ability to keep the momentum going," he said. "I see the Goddard School's vision, and I know we can be known as a top regional school in the western United States."

Under his leadership, UCO's business college successfully reaffirmed accreditation from the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business. The college also implemented a new mission and vision, revitalized the award-winning Broncho Business Leaders mentorship program, created a student-run investment fund, launched the "Ready...Set...Work" career-readiness initiative, and has begun construction on a new student lounge and study space. At UCO, he has also served as chair of the economics department and a professor of economics, earning multiple awards for excellence in teaching and service.

Oller said he looks forward to his new role at Weber State, where he intends to foster a team-focused culture that prioritizes students, an environment that supports the work of faculty and staff, and a school that keeps the interests of the community in mind: "No matter what I do, I try to bring a lot of energy, a lot of passion. I'm all about listening to new ideas, encouraging creativity, and staying team-focused."

Oller earned his bachelor's degree in economics at UCO before transferring to the University of Oklahoma for his Ph.D. in economics and Juris Doctor. His research focuses on antitrust policy, energy markets, pedagogy, and taxation policy for alcoholic beverages.

He will join WSU on July 7, taking the reins from **Doris Geide-Stevenson**, who has served as the Goddard School's interim dean since July 2022.


