She attended the <u>University of Washington</u>, where she studied creative writing with <u>Theodore Roethke</u> and later <u>Nelson Bentley</u> as well as <u>David Wagoner</u> and <u>Mark Strand</u>. Her honors include a fellowship from the <u>Guggenheim Foundation</u>, two <u>National Endowment for the Arts</u> awards, the The Maxine Cushing Gray Endowed Libraries Visiting Writers Fellowship (University of Washington), and the Elliston Award for "best book of poetry published by a small press" for the collection *Instructions to the Double* (1976). Her late husband, <u>Raymond Carver</u>, encouraged her to write short stories, some of which were collected in *The Lover of Horses* (1987) and *At the Owl Woman Saloon* (1996).

Gallagher has taught at many colleges, most recently at <u>Bucknell University</u> and <u>Whitman College</u>.
