## TIM O'BRIEN

William Timothy "Tim" O'Brien (born October 1, 1946) is an American <u>novelist</u> best known for his work of fiction, <u>*The Things They Carried*</u> (1990), a critically acclaimed collection of semi-autobiographical, interrelated short stories inspired by O'Brien's experiences in the <u>Vietnam War</u>. In addition, he is known for his <u>war novel</u>, <u>*Going After*</u> <u>*Cacciato*</u> (1978), also written about wartime Vietnam.<sup>[4]</sup>

O'Brien has held the endowed chair at the <u>MFA program</u> of <u>Texas State University–San</u> <u>Marcos</u> every other year since the 2003-2004 year. O'Brien won the 1979 <u>National Book</u> <u>Award</u> for <u>Going After Cacciato</u>. His novel <u>In the Lake of the Woods</u> won the <u>James</u> <u>Fenimore Cooper Prize for Best Historical Fiction</u> in 1995. In August 2012, O'Brien received the <u>Dayton Literary Peace Prize Foundation</u>'s Richard C. Holbrooke Distinguished Achievement Award. In June 2013, O'Brien was awarded the \$100,000 <u>Pritzker Military Library Literature Award</u>.
