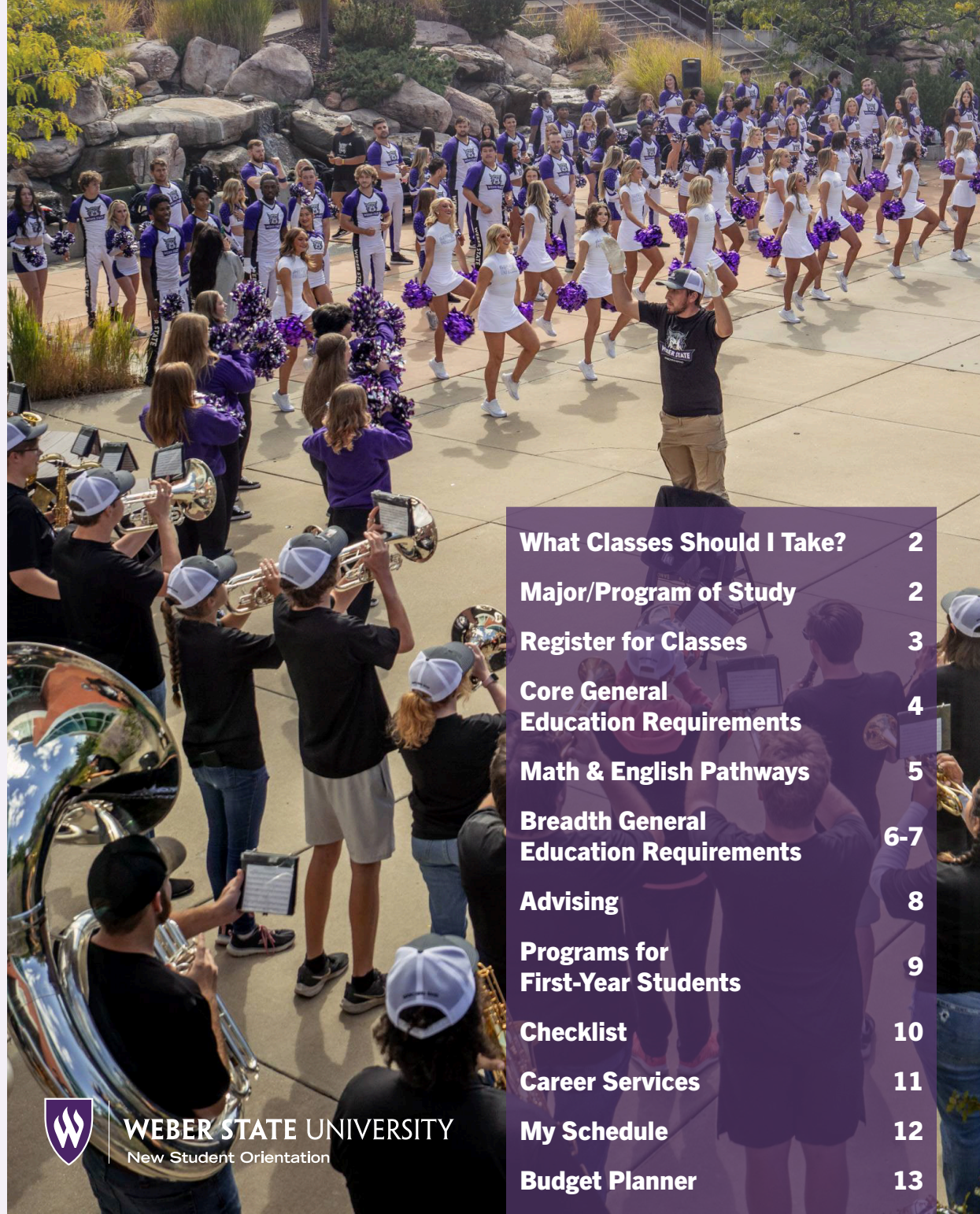

New Student Orientation

What Classes Should I Take?

During their first semesters, students are encouraged to take general education courses, major exploration courses, and prerequisite requirements in their major.



GRAD MAPS

Grad Maps show a semester-by-semester plan for taking all classes needed to earn your degree. Log in to your eWeber Portal to find the app.

If you already know what you want your major (i.e. Program of Study) to be, you can check out Grad Maps to see some example schedules of classes you need to take depending on your catalog year (the year you started school). There are class schedule examples for Associate's and Bachelor's in most majors and General Education Associate's options.



UNIVERSITY CATALOG

The university catalog includes academic policies, degree requirements, course descriptions, and other essential student information. Log in to your eWeber Portal to find the app.

To learn more about course offerings, click the "Course Descriptions" link in the catalog app. Beyond individual courses, the catalog outlines all degree requirements, including program prerequisites, minor requirements, grade and credit hour specifications, advisement resources, program admission criteria (if applicable), and general education courses that can fulfill major requirements.

Major/Program of Study

Your Program of Study refers to the main focus of your studies and will appear on your diploma. About half of your courses will be in your major. The others will be general education courses, minor or electives, prerequisites courses, or teacher education courses (for teaching majors).



CHANGE MY MAJOR

If you ever need to change your major, you can do so using the Change My Major app. Log into your eWeber Portal to find the app.

Some departments require a meeting with an academic advisor before approving your major change, and a few may have additional steps. Don't worry—the app will guide you through everything you need to do to confirm your new major. You're welcome to change your major as often as you like. Before you make any decisions, we recommend connecting with an academic advisor to understand how your current credits apply to your new path. This way, you can make informed decisions and stay on track for graduation.

The Change My Major app can also be used to drop programs of study but you cannot drop all majors or become "undeclared."

STRUGGLING WITH WHICH MAJOR TO CHOOSE?

The Major Exploration & Career Design program was designed for you! The program is built with busy student schedules in mind and is divided into these steps:

1. Take the Strong Interest Inventory (SII) Assessment.
2. Attend a Major Exploration Workshop.
3. Meet with an Exploratory Advisor.
4. Declare Bachelor's Degree major, if applicable.
5. Meet with a Career Advisor to begin Career Design.

CAREER COURSE

Career Planning & Exploration (EDUC 2900, 3 credits) is an elective course to help you explore options and design your future. It is taught face-to-face and online.

REGISTRATION SCHEDULE BUILDER

This app helps you plan your semester schedule. Log into your eWeber Portal to find the app.

Once you know which classes you want to take, use this app to build a class schedule that works around your schedule and ensures no overlapping of classes.

This app is what you use to add and drop classes. Log into your eWeber Portal to find the app.

Search for courses using any of the fields listed, or click on "Advanced Search" for more options. When you find a course you wish to register for, click "Add" to include the class in the "Summary" area.

Finalize Your Registration

- Click "Submit."
 - If you are successful, the course status for each course will change from "pending" to "registered."
 - If you are not successful, an error message will appear. Please screenshot the error message and send to registration@weber.edu.

Plans (To Plan for Future Semesters)

Select the plan to use. Then click "Add All." This will insert all the course sections in the plan into the summary area.

OR click "Add" to one section at a time to the summary area.

If the plan does not contain a specific section, click "View sections" for each course and find the section you want. Click "Add" to include the class to the "Summary" area.

Enter CRN (Course Reference Number)

For each section you want to add, enter the CRN in the "CRN" field and click "Add to Summary."

Both Registration apps have advanced filters that can help you avoid common registration mistakes. For example, you can filter classes by campus.

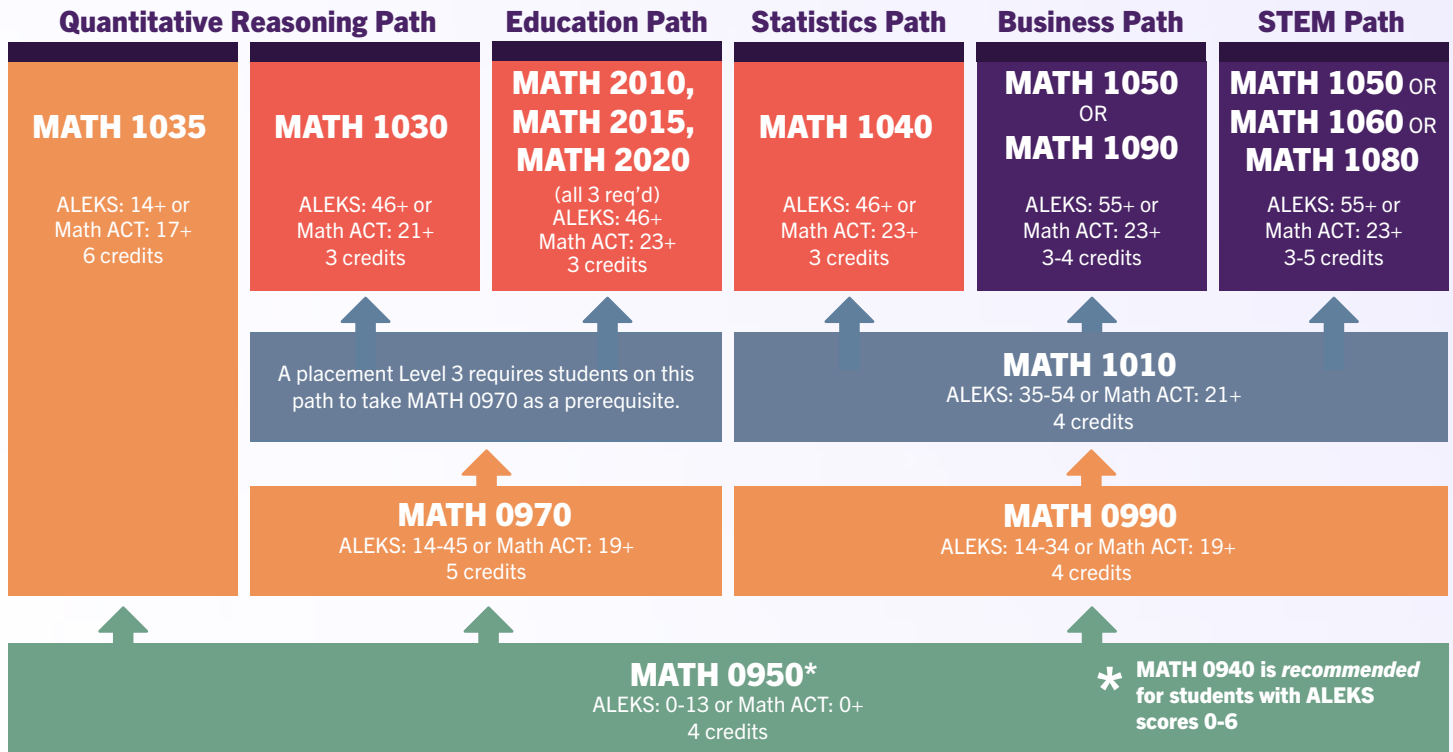

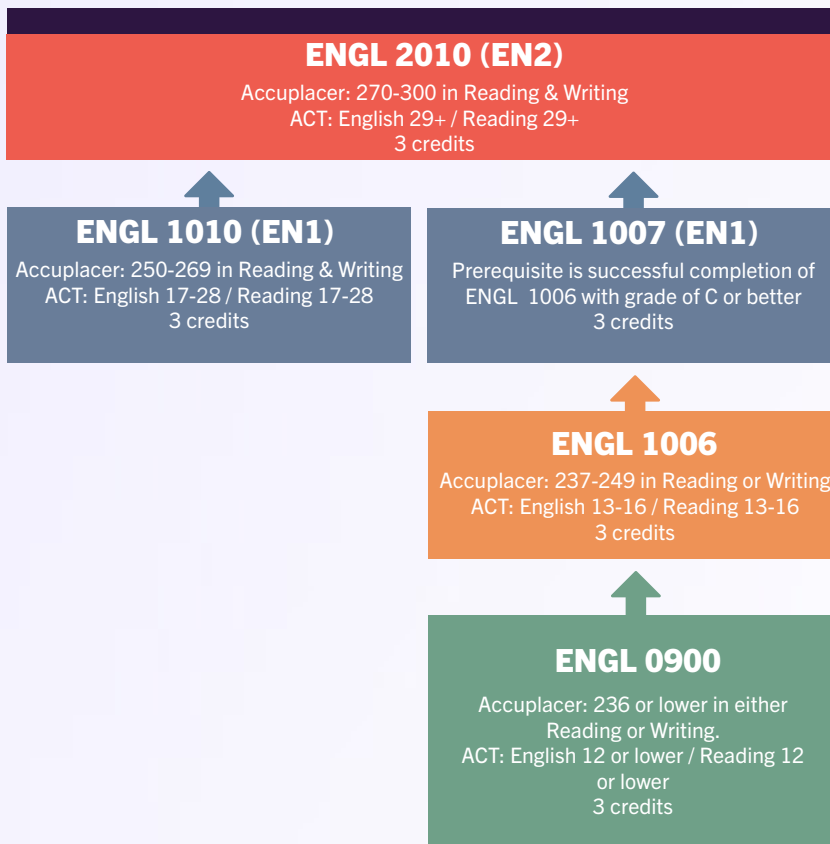

Advising

Support is a pretty big deal here at Weber State! While there are tons of resources for advising, we suggest you prioritize meeting with your Academic Advisor to ensure you are on track to graduate on time and to avoid spending money on classes you don't need. Review below the different types of academic advisors we have at Weber and our other advising support resources.

ACADEMIC ADVISORS:

Remember to meet with your academic advisor while preparing to register for classes for the next semester. Find your academic advisor at weber.edu/advisors.

General Studies & Exploratory Advisors support students pursuing a Certificate or Associate's degree in General Studies. These advisors help students by fostering essential life skills, facilitating major exploration during general education, and guiding their transition into a chosen academic program.

College Academic Advisors support students who have declared their major. These advisors help students with selecting appropriate classes for their major.

Faculty Advisors are instructors who also advise students for their major. Some faculty advisors do major advising, while others have more of a mentor advising approach aimed at career and/or graduate school advising.

 - International Program students and those accepted in a Radiologic Sciences specialty program can meet this requirement with a Specialized Orientation Session.

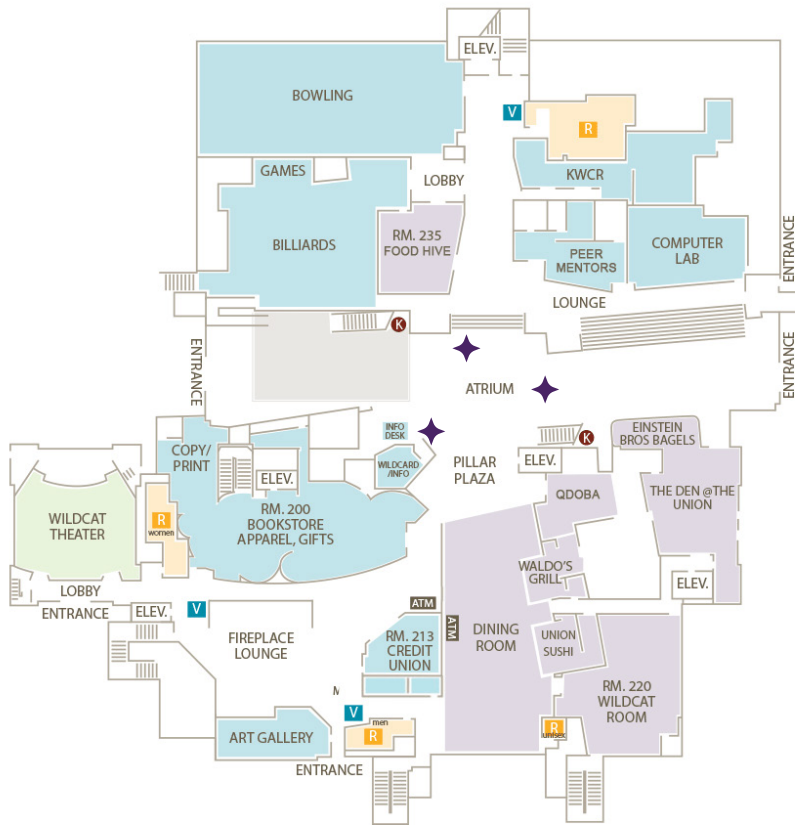

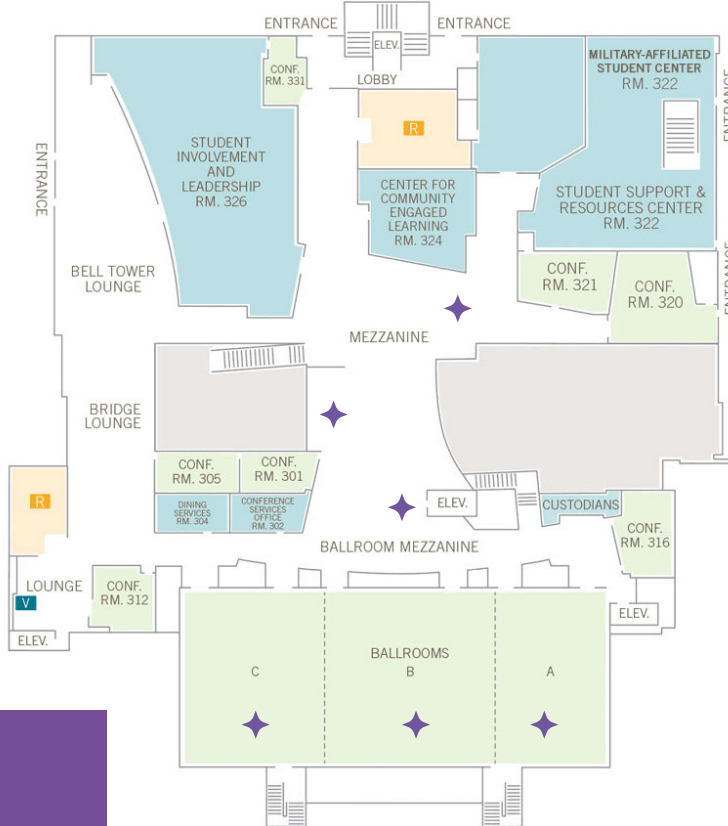
