II. Web CT - the Course Website

III. Course Objectives

- A. To learn about 'human nature' and behavior from the perspective of the discipline of scientific psychology.
- B. To introduce students to the field of Psychology, its different specializations and sub-areas, and psychological methods used in research, teaching and practice. Specifically, this class covers the general topics of: the biological basis of behavior, learning, motivation, sensation, perception, memory, thought, knowledge, language, social psychology, consciousness, research methods and statistics, personality, and psychological disorders and their treatments.
- C. To integrate theories and research with real-life applications so as to make the study of Psychology both interesting and meaningful to the students.
- D. To encourage students to prepare themselves for the real-life application of their degree if they major in Psychology by educating them about different careers in psychology, graduate school in psychology, and applications of psychology in other careers.
- E. To appreciate that all behavior is the result of a complex interaction between genetic, biological, cognitive, environmental, and social-cultural factors.

IV. Course Grade

A. Examinations (80% of final grade)

- 1. Five exams will be taken during the course of this semester and will collectively account for 80% of your final grade (i.e. each individual exam will constitute 16% of your final grade).
- 2. The fifth and final exam will be taken on Dec. 4-10. No exams may be taken after Thursday Dec. 10
- 3. All exams will be taken via Chitester online software and will be available in multiple testing centers: Davis, Kaysville, Lampros, Marriot Health, Morgan, Social Sciences, Student Services, and West. Note: The Science Building Testing Center does not currently support computer based testing. You will have 2 days to take each exam. Please note the testing center hours listed on the WSU web site (for the Social Science Center currently listed as: 7:30am to 8pm Monday to Thursday, 7:30am-4:30pm Friday, 9am-4pm Saturday). YOU MUST ARRIVE AT LEAST ONE HOUR before the testing center closes or they will not permit you to take the exam. You must have your student ID. A practice exam will be available on Chitester by the second week of class so you can become familiar with the software before Exam One.

B. Make-up Examinations/Missing Exams

If you know of a conflict with the exam schedule, you may take ANY exam early but **must notify me in writing of your intention to do so as early as possible.** IF FOR ANY REASON YOU MISS AN EXAM you must notify me in writing immediately. You may take the exam one day late (for a 10 point deduction) or two days late (for a 20 point deduction). You will not be able to take an exam three or more "business days" (i.e. days the testing center is open, Mon.-Sat.) after the scheduled dates and will receive a zero for this exam.

C. Homework Assignments (10% of final grade)

Six pass/fail homework assignments will be given during the course to highlight key psychological concepts and facilitate group discussion. One "failed" homework assignment will be dropped; each of the five remaining assignments will be worth 2% of the final course grade. No excuses will be accepted for missing or late assignments. Assignments must be typed and handed in at the beginning of class on the due date. Assignments handed in any time 5 minutes after class begins will be considered late and not accepted.

D. Research Participation (10% of final grade)

An important part of taking an introduction to psychology class is to understand and experience how knowledge in psychology is acquired. Therefore, 10% of your grade will be based on research participation. You will need to complete 8 research credits to receive full credit. More detailed and specific information is

contained in a handout that is posted on WebCT. For this course, research participation (or alternatives) must be completed one week before the final class meeting date.

E. Extra Credit Opportunities

Each exam will have an extra credit opportunity included with the questions. These are questions that require you to integrate information and go above and beyond what you normally would learn for the exam. You may earn up to 4 percentage points for each exam through the exam extra credit.

VI. Additional Information

A. Attendance
