Course Objectives:

- 1. Learn basic theories and problems associated with the study of adolescent development and socialization.
- 2. Think critically about adolescent development theory and research and form your own personal understanding and beliefs about adolescent development.
- 3. Apply current research and psychological and developmental theories to basic problems facing adolescents in today's society.

Requirements:

1. Class Attendance and Participation.

- 2. Writing Assignment (final paper). You have the option of: 1) Writing a paper about a specific topic related to adolescent development that could be presented to a specific audience (adolescents, parents, or professional group).

 2) Developing and writing an intervention or program for your community that treats a specific type of adolescent problem. Your paper must be 10-14 pages, type written double spaced, Times New Roman (size 12) font, and include a minimum of 10 professional references. Please start your paper early. Papers turned in late will be deducted 10% for the first day and 2% per day thereafter that the assignment is late (including weekend days). You must clear your chosen topic with me. If you plagiarize at all you will be given a score of zero on the paper. You are responsible to understand what plagiarism means. For example see
- **3. Examinations.** Each of the three exams will be available in the Social Science Testing Center, Lampros Hall Testing Center, Ogden- West Testing Center and Davis Campus Testing Center. The exams are multiple-choice and essay. Questions will be drawn from both the required text and class lectures.

The majority of questions will be drawn from the text with the remaining coming from class lectures. The final exam is not comprehensive.
