AWARD-WINNING PODCAST

The Just Ask Podcast is a student-led podcast facilitated through the Olene S. Walker Institute of Politics & Public

VOTER-FRIENDLY CAMPUS

For the fourth year in a row, Weber State University was designated a <u>Voter Friendly Campus</u> by Fair Elections Center's Campus Vote Project and NASPA. We were recognized for the excellent work completed by the Weber State Votes initiative that encourages student engagement in our democracy. These efforts made a powerful impact, resulting in 1,613 students registering to vote through our voter registration link and 1,483 ballots being collected at the Weber State ballot box.

Our CSBS Student Senator Ruby Vejar received the Young Diplomat Award from Utah Global Diplomacy.
